Paige McKenzie's Project

Paige McKenzie 7B

The HOL students were given a challenge to discover the sequence of threading needed to achieve the hour glass shape of this project. The honour bestowed upon the student who discovered the sequence was to have the HOL project named after them.

After many attempts (and near successes) by other HOL students, this honour went to Paige McKenzie of 7B.

I have to admit she was very determined to have this project named after her. Through her perseverance which did include some frustrating moments, she managed to solve the sequence. Throughout she maintained a high focus which was pleasing to see. The 'Hour Glass Project' is now called the 'The Paige Project'.



Haider Albadran's Project

Haider's project was to build a crate entirely out of recycled palletwood which had to be completed before the end of this year.

Part of this project was to determine the appropriate drill bit and screw size to use. Haider was also required to sort out, measure and mark out the components. With the use of a combination square he located and marked suitable locations to drill the holes for the screws.




